SENATOR WESELY: May we have a roll call.

SPEAKER NICHOL: A roll call vote has been asked for.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next motion I have is offered by Senators Pappas, Kilgarin, and Newell. They would move that LB 769 become law notwithstanding the objections of the Governor.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Who is going to handle that? Senator Kilgarin.

SENATOR KILGARIN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I will make this very, very brief. LB 769 simply follows along with what we did last year in reducing the collection fee of 3 percent to 1 percent for the retailers. This will do the exact same thing for the cities in our state who have the sales tax. The fiscal year, '84-85, cost is \$334,000. I know this bill is being very heavily lobbied. I don't pretend I can out-lobby both the administration and the NSEA, maybe separately but not together, but I think it is the right thing to do. I think it is the fair thing to do. I would appreciate your support for this bill. Thank you.
