

many, many cases of those drugs. The disposition of those drugs is now at issue in the United States District Court in a lawsuit filed there. The State Patrol has been unable effectively to move against particularly this mail order distribution house in Omaha which is supplying not just the Midwest but responding to orders that it receives throughout the nation. So it is a real problem. It has taken us this long to come up with satisfactory language because essentially we are making illegal the sale of a substance which technically is legal, but is illegal only because of the way it is being represented in the sale, or because of the way it is packaged. That obviously presents difficulties. I know Senator Chambers intends to address those difficulties. But it is our position, the majority of the Judiciary Committee's position, that this language will adequately deal with the problem and that the year finally has come, after four years of study and examination and the introduction of bills, to take a step against the look-alike problem and put these large-scale distributors in Omaha out of business and put the small-scale distributors in the high schools of Omaha and elsewhere in the state out of business, and to give our law enforcement officers effective tools to deal with this problem which they currently don't have. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Hoagland, we are going to not finish the bill today, not advance the bill today. We do have an amendment on it and I don't wish to crowd the discussion on this type of bill. So, with your permission, we will forward it to a later date. I don't know about tomorrow necessarily, but at least not finish today. So, with that, Mr. Clerk, do you have anything further to say into the record?

CLERK: One item, Mr. President, Constitutional Revision and Recreation reports 557 to General File. That is signed by Senator Rupp as Chair. (See page 469 of the Legislative Journal.) That is all that I have.
