

with this bill. I don't think he fully understands the effect these changes would make so I would urge you to vote against all of these amendments. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: May we have order in the Chamber, please. (Cavel.) The Chair recognizes Senator Landis. Senator Landis, do you wish to speak? Senator Goll, very well. Senator Higgins, do you wish the floor?

SENATOR HIGGINS: Yes, thank you, Mr. President, I am totally confused. First of all, Senator Hoagland, would you yield to a question, please? I plead ignorant, but what exactly...I don't see in the bill where they define a controlled substance. Maybe I am missing it. What is a controlled substance? Is that a prescription drug or...exactly what is a controlled substance?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: If you'll look at page 2 of the bill, Senator Higgins, you'll see in lines 11 through 13 reference made to an earlier section and the same set of sections...

SENATOR HIGGINS: Uh huh.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: ...indicating controlled substances are classed into Schedule I, II, or III drugs set out in Section 28-405. Remember, we moved across to Final Reading yesterday Senator Lynch's bill that expands a list of controlled substances to make it conform with the federal list.

SENATOR HIGGINS: Could you just give me some examples of what they are?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Well, if you'll look at Senator Lynch's bill, what is the number of that, Senator Lynch, 503 or something? If you'll look at Senator Lynch's bill that we passed over to Final Reading yesterday, there are pages and pages of controlled substances that are set out by their chemical names.

SENATOR HIGGINS: Well, if they are set out by a chemical name, then I might not know what they are. I mean, No-Doz, the pill that keeps you awake all night, is that a controlled...you buy it over the counter, is that a controlled substance? I'm thinking in terms of stuff...am I wrong in considering these things that are sold over the
