

kind of laws going to stop this?

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You all need to learn how to talk to your children, and remember that you were children at one time too. It is not easy to have confidence in adults who, every time you approach them, are going to talk about doing something to you. The instance that Senator Pirsch mentioned, about these pills that these persons were taking and they didn't do the work, remember those were not look-alikes, those were supposedly legitimate medications made by legitimate pharmaceutical houses and they would not come under this bill. It has to be a look-alike of a controlled substance. So if you want to make it a look-alike of a nonprescription drug and you sell it for that, that is all right. If there are drugs out there like cough medicines that have a lot of alcohol in them and somebody gets a rise out of that, you can look alike that all you want to and that is no crime. It has got to be represented or made to look like a controlled substance.

PRESIDENT: Time, Senator. Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I've not participated in this discussion to this point. I recognize the concern of the introducers of this bill. I recognize that a problem does exist out on the streets and in the schools and businesses of the State of Nebraska. It has been a dozen years since I first introduced the series of bills which attempted to deal with the problem of the illicit dealer of drugs, of illegal drugs and other drugs used illegally. At that time I don't think any person in this body, any senator, was more helpful in hammering out the kind of legislation which we have today than was Senator Chambers, Senator DeCamp, Senator Carsten, a few others who were here at that time. I really wonder some times what direction we are going to go. This afternoon Senator Pirsch and I have another bill before the committee which we attempt to deal with the problem of the driver who uses drugs with or without a combination of alcohol. We will have to address the problem of how do you test for that problem. Most of the people I have visited with in law enforcement point out to me that there is a problem, but that the tests are so inconclusive and the problem is so widespread that they really don't know what to do.
