Mr. President, LR 56 signed by Senator Pappas and other members of the Legislature, I am sorry, Senator Marsh and other members of the Legislature. (Read. See page 748-749 of the Legislative Journal.) That will be laid over, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Very well, are we ready then to go on to General File?

CLERK: Just one other item, Mr. President, LR 57 offered by Senator Pappas. (Read. See pages 749-751 of the Legislative Journal.) That, Mr. President, will be laid over as well.

PRESIDENT: Very well. Go now then to General File, LB 213.

CLERK: Mr. President, 213 was a bill that was offered initially by Senator Wesely. (Read title.) The bill was referred to the Business and Labor Committee for hearing. The bill was advanced to General File. The Legislature considered the bill on February 21, Mr. President. At that time the committee amendments were adopted. I now have pending a motion to advance the bill.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Wesely. The motion is to advance LB 213. Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Thank you. Mr. President, members, I would like to take as little time as possible on the debate on this. We spent quite a bit of time on this issue and ran out of time on it before. LB 213, just to refresh your memory, is a bill that was up last year dealing with how we define supervisor for public employees. Last year's bill made it to Final Reading and lost not once but twice by a vote I think it was to pass last year so it was reintroduced this year and again raises the same points as last year, that is to say that the definition of supervisor is one that there is conflict over and that we were trying to utilize from the NLRA, the National Labor Relations Act, language to define what a supervisor is and who is not a supervisor so that that definition is clear in our state statutes.
