

else on the bill?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Haberman would move to indefinitely postpone the bill. That would lay it over unless the introducer agrees to take it up at this time.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Warner, do you wish to take it up? Okay. Senator Haberman, on the kill motion.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, members of the body, I talked to Senator Warner and he said we might as well take it up today as to wait, but seeing as we don't have the votes to kill, I'll withdraw the motion and wait until the fiscal note catches up with it.

SPEAKER NICHOL: All right. No objection? So ordered. It is withdrawn. Anything else on the bill?

CLERK: I have nothing further on the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: We're back to the bill. Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, I need to make one correction because I looked at the committee report without carefully reading Senator Landis' amendment to the committee amendment and, Senator Beutler, Chris, you had asked about the Public Service Commission. Senator Landis' amendment is such that the effect for them does not take effect until January 1 of 1987. So they would remain at their current \$27,000 and would be adjusted at \$35,000 in 1987. So there is no fiscal impact on LB 43 during fiscal year '86-87, or correction, '85-86 that we are dealing with this year. There will be an A bill for the last half of the fiscal year '86-87 obviously because that salary adjustment takes effect during that fiscal year. But again, if there is no further motions, Mr. President, I would choose not to offer the motion then to advance the bill. I assume it is in the shape that the majority of the body finds acceptable and when the A bill is here and the Rules Committee has proposed a different route for A bills, why we can take this one up along with the others that will be available to us then.

SPEAKER NICHOL: So you're not moving to advance the bill. Is that correct? Senator Haberman, do you wish to speak on the bill?
