PRESIDENT: We are moved to the motions on the desk.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Hoagland, pursuant to a motion found on page 728 of the Journal, would move to suspend the rules so as to allow the Judiciary Committee to introduce a bill after the time for introduction and allow the committee another bill for its introduction.

PRESIDENT: Senator Hoagland.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Mr. President, colleagues, being passed out right now is a section by section analysis of a bill that we would propose to introduce at this time. This bill has been brought to us by Judge Fahrbruch's Nebraska Supreme Court Committee on practice and procedure. It is a very technical bill, not of considerable significance in terms of being a major issue but something that it is necessary to act on this session, if possible, for the sake of the smooth operation of the appellate procedure in the judicial system. It is not as if we in the Judiciary Committee need any more bills. We, I think, have about 105 or 106 that have been referred to us already. We apologize for making this late request but I am afraid it is something we need to deal with this session and I would ask that you suspend the rules to allow us to introduce this bill, have a quick hearing on the bill and I would expect to advance it to the floor for consideration this session. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The motion is to suspend the rules for the purpose of introducing a bill late in time. Is there further discussion on this motion? If not, you will vote on the motion. 30 votes are required. All those in favor of suspending the rules for this purpose vote aye, opposed vote no. The motion is to suspend the rules for the purpose of introducing a new bill. Please record your vote. The motion pending before the house is to suspend the rules. Please record your vote. We are voting to suspend the rules for purpose of introducing a new bill. We need some assistance in this motion, senators, if those who are not in the Chamber if you have not recorded your vote, please record aye or nay on the suspension of rules. Have you all voted? The Clerk will record the vote.
