

their agents? For the purpose of Section 1 to 6 of this act starting in line 11 going through 17 is a description of library materials. Included are a pamphlet, a newspaper, a coin. For taking a newspaper or defacing a newspaper or tearing a newspaper in the library subjects you to all of the sanctions provided for in this bill, including arrest at your home without a warrant. If you look in lines 18 through 24, you will see one of the most bizarre provisions I have encountered in our legislation. "Any person who shall deliberately provide a library with false information concerning his or her identity and address with intent to gain a pecuniary or other benefit, or other benefit for himself, herself or another, shall be guilty of criminal impersonation. Such person shall be penalized as provided in Section 28-608." Let's say that a person files an application for a job at the library and gives some false information about where he or she lives. It is not a crime to give false information on a job application now, but for some reason the librarians are to be given this kind of broad authority so that if you give them false information and the intent in getting a job is to get a pecuniary and other benefits, you are guilty of a crime. That is another thing this bill does. Then if you go over to page 3 at the top, you must start at the bottom of page 2 and see about this arrest matter. "whether or not"...I am reading on page 3 now, starting in line 2, "whether or not such arrest takes place on the library premises." If the arrest need not take place on the premises, that means it can take place anywhere, no need for a warrant. Somebody comes to your house to arrest you and the power to arrest implies the power to enter. No warrant, no uniform, nothing to identify this person as a super cop with powers that the State Patrol doesn't have, the FBI does not have, the local police do not have, the sheriff does not have, but the librarian's agent does. So they come banging on your door or kicking it in and say, you have got a newspaper. Then they come in and they find you do have a newspaper but you purchased it out of one of the boxes that the World Herald has so they say, I'm sorry, the mistake is mine, and they are immune from any kind of chastisement or punishment or consequences of their act because they can say, well, I thought that the newspaper this person took was stolen from the library, or I saw what appeared to be a pamphlet in this person's pocket or concealed in the pages of a book. That is some of the nonsense this bill talks about. Then they talk about posting some kind of notice on the wall. I mentioned just a
