So I don't worry about those points. But if you are worried about those points, what does that say about you? So I don't think it is wrong to maintain that point violation. If you want to neuter it more, well, then you will probably go with Senator Chambers. But I say let's attempt to keep this a strong firm statement, and in maintaining that firm statement, then I think we will keep a point violation. I ask you to oppose Senator Chambers' amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Labeledz.
