

booth. You may have people working in that organization for an hour or two during the two or three-day festival. It would be impossible to go around and license those people. Sometimes you just pick them out of the crowd and ask them if they'd help out in a booth. So we are just saying that only those people that are paid to sell pickle cards, or are paid by an organization to work at a bingo will need to have a special permit. Part five removes the reference to lottery and raffle tickets that the department agreed was not necessary for enforcement purposes. Part six clarifies the extent of the department's liability in confiscation proceedings. Number seven, redefines the department's authorization to enter places where bingo is conducted or pickles are sold. And part eight is just a technical change. I urge the adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Hefner, please.

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. President and members of the body, I rise to support the Labeledz amendment. My staff and I have been working with Senator Labeledz and I commend her for bringing these amendments forward. We think that they will improve the bill and do some of the things that we perhaps omitted in the earlier drafting of the bill. Therefore, I would urge you to support the Labeledz amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Did you wish to close, Senator Labeledz?

SENATOR LABEDZ: Thank you, Senator Hefner. I certainly hope that you will agree with me on the next amendment. Actually, there is no closing. I move for the adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The question is the adoption of the Labeledz amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays on adoption of Senator Labeledz's amendment to the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The Labeledz amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next amendment I have is offered by Senator Labeledz. It is found on page 1880 of the Journal.
