

alternate year scheduling in these small high schools. In other words, you teach physics one year and you teach chemistry the next year. You combine the junior and senior classes. Instead of having two classes of four, you have one class of eight, for instance. And that amendment would allow the full credit to the school for teaching both classes even though only one class was taught. This is a further refinement of that amendment. Mr. Cunningham wanted to be sure that the private schools were also included under that provision so he offered the amendment to specifically include the private schools. That is the first part of the amendment. Then the other part of the amendment is technical. What page is that, Mr. Clerk? I can't remember.

CLERK: 2052, Senator.

SENATOR LAMB: 2052. The other one, it changes one word. We had biannual in there meaning every other year but I guess biannual spelled with an "a" means twice a year according to the bill drafter so he wants to change the spelling of that word to "biennial" with an "e". Now I didn't realize that that was the case and this gap in my education, I don't know whether you can credit it to the fact that I did not apply myself diligently, or the fact that I attended a Class I school, or the fact that I attended the University of Nebraska, but anyway this escaped my notice and we need to correct that small matter. I would move the adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT: Probably relates to your education at the University. You know about "N" on the University Stadium, don't you? It stands for knowledge. The motion is to adopt the amendment offered by Senator Lamb. Further discussion? Senator Haberman, you have your light on. All those in favor of the amendment offered by Senator Lamb vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 29 ayes, 0 nays on adoption of Senator Lamb's amendment to the bill.

PRESIDENT: The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Vickers would move to amend the bill. (See Vickers amendment on Legislative Journal page 2172.)
