

high risk pregnancy bill. But the Appropriations Committee chose not to do that. So what I am simply offering in this amendment to the committee amendment is to put the contents of the high risk pregnancy program, which virtually all of us support, into the committee amendment so that we in effect would have a reduction in the ADC unborn program by \$600,000, but at the same time we would have an appropriation of \$90,000 to the newly formed high risk pregnancy program. They both relate to the very same issue which is the availability of financing and medical services to women who are pregnant and in the case of the high risk pregnancy program to women whose pregnancies are more likely than not to result in difficult births. And that is the nature of the amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Any further discussion on the amendment?
Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President and members of the body, Senator Johnson, would you please take me by the hand and tell me just exactly...

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: Yes, sir.

SENATOR HABERMAN: ...what is going on. As I understand it from the little bit that I have heard or whatever, we are taking 201...

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: Yes, sir.

SENATOR HABERMAN: ...and we are changing 201 and doing something with 31.

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: Yes, sir.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Now what is the fiscal note or was the fiscal note if you have any idea on 201?

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: \$90,000 for the '85-86 fiscal year and \$450,000 for the '86-87 fiscal year.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Now what is the fiscal note for 31?

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: LB 31 saves the state \$600,000 for the '85-86 fiscal year. Okay. So the wash...LB 31 saves the state \$600,000, LB 201 costs the state \$90,000. The
