

Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Senator DeCamp and Senator Beutler are already talking about adding things back in. So they have a two percent cut. Now they are talking about we are going to add things back in. Well, if we are going to add things back in, we better take Senator Chambers' extra \$2.5 million and add that back in, then we'll end up with the 2 percent cut. If we just take the two percent cut and start adding everything back in, we are going to end up right where we are now. So think about that. Think about that. Take Senator Chambers' amendment, that gives you an extra \$2.5 million to play with after you put that back in, then you'll be at the original 2 percent cut that we just voted on. The body voted to cut two percent. If you add back in, it won't be a two percent cut, so, therefore, let's support Senator Chambers' amendment. Then if 25 votes want to nibble and pick and add a little bit back in, that will be fine. We can still end up with Senator Beutler's two percent cut. I think that will be fine. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Question.

PRESIDENT: The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. I have to put the question to you. There are a number of lights still on. Question is, shall the debate cease on the Chambers amendment to the DeCamp amendment? All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Motion is to cease debate on the Chambers amendment. Please record your vote if you wish to vote. Motion is to cease debate. Please record your vote. Have you all voted? Mr. Clerk, record the vote.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate.

PRESIDENT: The motion carries. Senator Chambers, you may close.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, because I'm not dealing with an amendment drafted by the Bill Drafter with numbered lines, I want to make it clear what it is I am intending to put back under the cut. If you have the sheet that Senator DeCamp gave
