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the restaurant, that type of thing. I just think you are way, way low in this particular figure. Now another thing, you say down here a little lower, it says to comply with this rule, unknowingly accept a gift, and then you go on a little further and say, well, we are going to prosecute you anyhow even though you correctly unknowingly accept it, then you correct it, we are going to prosecute you anyhow. Could you kind of elaborate on both of those points because I think you are on real weak ground on this one with both of those points.

SENATOR BEUTLER: No, I don't think there is a problem there, Senator Goodrich, in my opinion. Basically, what we are saying is that if you recognize that you unknowingly did it, then you can return it, but the fact that you just up and return something of value is not going to exclude you or prohibit prosecution if in fact it turns out that you returned it only to avoid the prosecution, for example.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Yes, but aren't you falling right into the trap that Senator DeCamp laid for us this morning where now you have somebody that you can really lay a trap for, and just because you bring his attention to the fact that, ya, I got you now, I got you under breaking of the rules, and now as a senator which happens to be on this committee, or a senator that happens to be a chairman of one of the two committees...

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR GOODRICH: ...I can really run it to you now. This is just fraught with problems as I see it. Now I voted for the one this morning for you but I don't think I am going to vote for this one. This has got to darn many traps in it.

PRESIDENT: Senator Goodrich, time has expired. The Chair recognizes Senator Marsh.

SENATOR MARSH: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I have some severe concerns regarding this item.

PRESIDENT: (Gavel.)

SENATOR MARSH: The person with whom I am working is a registered lobbyist. We are working on a bill that I am
