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and in fact members live in Omaha, Lincoln, Columbus, and other cities in Nebraska, and in major cities around the country. If anything they tend to pry on financially troubled farmers as their victims who are searching for answers about their businesses and their particular way of life. I guess with that, Mr. Speaker, I would urge that we advance the bill.

PRESIDENT: Senator Haberman, do you wish to be recognized on Senator Chizek's motion?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, members of the body, questions of Senator Chizek please. Senator Chizek, although I am in favor with the general all concept of your legislation, I have two questions that I would like to ask. On page 3, you state that for any person to teach or demonstrate to any other person the use, application, or making of any firearm, explosive, or incendiary device, or any technique capable of causing injury or death to persons when such persons know or has reasons to know, now aren't we asking people to guess as to what is or is not unlawful? I mean if they guess wrong, then they are guilty, right?

SENATOR CHIZEK: No.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Isn't this pretty vague?

SENATOR CHIZEK: No, I don't think it...Senator, I think if you look at that article, "...to unlawfully employ such training, practice, instruction, or techniques for use in or in the furtherance of a civil disorder."

SENATOR HABERMAN: Okay, let me have another question then beings as you are evading the first question. Now you can't use this training in paramilitary activities, right? That is what it says. A civil disorder, you can't use it.

SENATOR CHIZEK: You can't use it for the furtherance or to create a civil disorder.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Okay, but is it okay if I say I want to use it to rob a bank?

SENATOR CHIZEK: No.

SENATOR HABERMAN: What do you mean, no? You don't
