PRESIDENT: One minute, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I have been talking nine minutes already? That can't be.

PRESIDENT: No, I didn't mean that, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, okay.

PRESIDENT: I want to do something else for you if I can.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, you don't have to do it for me. That's...

PRESIDENT: Get a little order in the Chamber here. (Gavel.)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It doesn't matter.

PRESIDENT: And I'm sorry I called it too early. You have five more minutes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. And I don't mind. This is like one of those situations where if you put a sword to somebody's neck and say, say, I believe, you can get them to say they believe but really they don't and I don't want to use any coercive power. I am speaking for the record and assembling the information that I want to get into my request for an Attorney General's Opinion and serving notice to the senators how silly this bill is, so they know. And with that knowledge, they are supporting it anyway, which, as I say, is par for the course for the Legislature with reference to issues that they have gotten their back up on. Now, there are certain groups that have been exempted from the operation of this bill, like veterans groups, ROTC groups, hunting clubs and all the rest that are listed in that group. Now, why should those groups be given the exclusive right to handle certain ideas and opinions? If this veterans group is engaging in the teaching about weapons and there are people present who intend to take that information and use it for a disorder, the weapons group, the veterans groups, are exempt from the bill, even though the result is going to be the same. People are going to take that information and turn it to use in a civil
