

what you are doing yet and what the cost and ramifications can be, and that is why I wish you would clarify this or get an opinion from the Attorney General on it to find out what it is going to be, because otherwise it could be an extra burden of cost to the state because the state is going to have to go on out to all the local district courts all the time to defend it. If that is the case...

SENATOR HEFNER: Senator Pappas, Senator Pappas, I wouldn't say that I don't care. I am very sincere in this, and I think it is or I know it is a workable bill and Senator Landis would like to respond to that.

SENATOR PAPPAS: No, I am not asking Senator Landis. I guess what I am talking about, sincerity is one thing, sincerity is one thing, but common sense and really knowing what you are doing, whether or not we are really helping or hindering the process of the State of Nebraska are two different things and I think we should ask for an AG's opinion on this and find out where the cost is going to be burdened or where the cost is, who is going to bear the cost in the defense of this before we advance this bill any further. I wished again that we would lay this bill over.
