Also there is a smaller amount that the Bureau of Examining Boards, \$534 of General Fund money, but again that would relate to health care and licensing of individuals. The Department of Labor, program 194, the amount is fairly small but was consistent with the overall policy. That particular program deals with OSHA where the state does some at request examination. It does also elevator inspections, but more specifically it also governs and supervises child labor laws. And it seems that that had a relationship to both health and education. In the case of public institutions, here again there are two programs, 033 and 365, both of which have aid programs contained within the program, 300,000 for alcohol and drug, and 300,000 for mental health, but also included in that same program is some operating funds for the central office, but also for each of the institutions at Lincoln, Hastings, and Norfolk. But in any event these two would be related to health care needs of those citizens that are affected by funding that agency. We also added the override for the Beatrice State Development Home, 152,000, with the same criteria, the health needs of those individuals. Program 26 is social services. The total cut was 420,000 General Fund, which actually translates into a \$1 million cut because there would be the corresponding loss or reduction of federal funds. It is our impression that the most likely thing, based upon discussions we've had in the past, the most likely way that that particular department, because they have so many mandated programs, entitlement programs, that they could accommodate this reduction, would be further restriction of hours or limiting of offices. But it is also conceivable that both adult and child protective services would be areas that could be subject to reduction in personnel. Obviously all of these relate to health needs, in particular, of citizens and would qualify. Program 524 of 69,000, again is for the care and education of children and was included. The Library Commission may be...you may wonder. The case, the Library Commission program 252, \$14,866, that particular program is the one which all this ties to education and health. This is the program where a year ago we moved all of the health films that formerly were distributed by the Department of Health to the Library Commission. These are films that are provided for schools and other civic clubs, variety of groups across the state. In addition it also is the same program that provides the funding for the interchange of information between libraries. All of these activities we relate to education and health.
