SENATOR VRTISKA: Okay, then the other question I have and I don't know if you can answer this or not, but when they are released with this shortened up time, are they subject to any parole or probation or they just go out that they serve their time, there is no restrictions on parole or is that an issue that the judge has charge of?

SENATOR LINDSAY: No, that's, parole would apply to the state prison system, would not apply to the...because the sentence is so short. Right.

SENATOR VRTISKA: I had thought that was true but I was trying to make clear that I understood it. So basically, what you're saying is the maximum time that anyone is going to be able to save is going to be a year and on your proposal if they were good guys, they could get out in six months?
