And do you know what the UNL people said right away? Well, we'll send professors to the job site, we'll send them right where Micron is, wherever that happens to be, and we will establish a course right there to meet all of Micron's needs. What more does a state have to sell? Will you let whoever runs Micron come in here and deliver the prayer every morning? They can't vote. I hope we don't get to the point where we let them vote on the floor also.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You wouldn't give them Omaha as a city to be named after them, which is just symbolic, but you're giving away everything else and how are you going to feel when Micron doesn't come? I haven't heard one of you, come to Nebraska, that is, I have not heard one of you stand on this floor and refute what...be cool, Senator Schimek, you're alert, you catch things very quick. Let your colleagues miss that one. I forgot where I was for a moment, because of what we're engaging in this buying and selling of integrity and other things. I want a person to stand on this floor and tell me categorically that Micron is coming to Nebraska to establish their business based on this stuff in this bill or any other considerations. I tell you they are not, and nobody wants to bet me. Why don't you? You're sitting there hoping and praying and wishing and think that somehow you will make something happen.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Time. Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Thank you. Madam President, members, Senator Hall's amendmer gives an opportunity to rise and discuss a little bit about this bill as well because the section that is being dealt with here talks about, as Senator Hall said, LB 775 and all the previous efforts, tax increment financing and all the other things we have done trying to attract business and have failed to stimulate the growth and population and quality of jobs that we've been looking for. And so the solution, as Senator Withem has talked about, is now we haven't done enough, let's do even more but more essentially the same thing. We aren't really trying something different to target what the needs are. We're not really focusing in on what exactly it is that we want to accomplish. I think we are simply once again
