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of great concern to me. It's like the other petition drives, and we talked about this...the other petition drives, it's easy to say let's limit property taxes, let's limit whatever spending, let's put limits here and limits there. But in the end it's the how do you get there questions that always are the tough ones. The easy part of it is to say we don't want to spend more money, we don't want to tax more. But as I understand it and looking at this handout from Senator Warner that the process you have in mind is to put this concept of a limit out, but then really to work on the how do we get there. Is that not correct, Senator Warner? I mean it's not so much the focus on the limitation but the consequences and the solutions to such a limitation, is that...

SENATOR WARNER: Senator Wesely, I view this as the resolution is the vehicle through which you generate the kind of discussion that you're talking about. If you're going to do this, and as you indicated it's exceedingly complex and the ramifications reach all over the place. And I think it's exceedingly important that we, as well as the public, have an opportunity to know those complexes, as best we can, through the help of the media.

SENATOR WESELY: And with that clarity and emphasis, I can rise in support of this, not to indicate that the particular proposal is something that I support, because constitutional amendments of this kind I've opposed in the past. But it's important to take control of the issue away from the petition drives out there that just tell people to sign on and vote for this because it will limit your taxes, to talking about the consequences of such an act. And let me give you some of my frustration because in the Health and Human Services Committee we had legislation we did put out that will reorganize state government agencies and bring them together in the Health Department that should improve efficiencies and do a more effective job of dealing with health care. I'm trying to think if we had anybody show up, other than me, to support that bill. We had legislation to take the boundaries of all these regional governments out there, these health and human service governments out there. Again, I don't think we had anybody else show up in support of this. It was a recommendation the from welfare task force. But, you know, we're struggling with this. There's plenty of opposition to change. They'll show up in droves to try and stop things that will consolidate and bring together agencies and governments to try and achieve efficiency. And all those folks out there
