PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion on the advancement of LB 382? Seeing none, Senator Lynch, do you wish to close? Closing is waived. The question before you is the advancement of LB 382. All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Have you all voted? Senator.

SENATOR LYNCH: With reluctance because we are so close and the need for only two more votes, and, in fact, maybe even one more vote, then I would...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator, for speaking so slowly. Please record.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on the advancement of LB 382.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: LB 382 advanced. LB 592.

CLERK: LB 592, a bill originally introduced by Senator Day at the request for the Governor. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 18 of this year, at that time was referred to the Judiciary Committee. The bill was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending by Judiciary Committee.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Chair recognizes Senator Hudkins to open on the committee amendments.

SENATOR HUDKINS: Thank you, Madam President and members of the body. AM1026 is the committee amendment and basically becomes the bill. This amendment is in your bill books. Most decrees for child support also contain provisions for visitation. Since 1985, when the Legislature passed LB 7 in the Second Special Session, court orders for support have been increasingly enforced by administrative means. Enforcement of the visitation portion of the order has been left to the judiciary. AM1026 contains two components. The first is an effort which restores a fundamental fairness to the system. Those provisions in LB 592 providing for the administrative revocation of professional, occupational and driver's licenses will apply equally to those who fail to pay child support and to those who interfere with court-ordered visitation.
