might possibly no longer be an option if the donor basically gets cold feet. But I can understand when we're talking about real property, you're talking about buildings and those types of things that there needs to be a review to see, as someone put it, that the cost of the gift to the state may far exceed the value of the gift itself, and I think that's probably good policy. My concern is just to make sure that we clearly spell out that this does not apply to cash donations. And, with that, again I rise in support of the motion to advance to E & R and I'll work with you if...maybe there is not a need to clarify that but if nothing else, for the record, we make it clear that it only applies to gifts of real property. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Hall. Is there any further discussion on the advancement of LB 530? Seeing none, Senator Lynch, do you wish to close? Closing is waived. The question before the body is the advancement of LB 530. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote nay. Please record.

CLERK: 29 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on the advancement of 530.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: LB 530 advances. Items for the record.

CLERK: Senator McKenzie to print amendments to LB 629; Senator Withem to LR 6CA. New resolution. Senator Lindsay and Pirsch offer LR 100. (Read brief summary.) That will be laid over. That's all that I have Madam President. (See pages 1845-46 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. We turn now to LB 99.

CLERK: Madam President, LB 99, a bill originally introduced by Senator Wickersham and others. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 5 of this year, referred to the Natural Resources Committee for public hearing. The bill was advanced to General File. There are Natural Resources Committee amendments pending.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The Chair recognizes Senator Beutler to open on the committee amendments.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Madam President and members of the Legislature, the committee amendments become the bill. And, for that reason, I want to make a few general comments explaining
