SENATOR BEUTLER: What does priority mean, Senator?

SENATOR ROBINSON: You want me to answer? You asked me a question, let me answer.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yes, I do, I do.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay. I think they would look at the number of applications, the number of schools with multiple buildings and then make that decision. I think if you had 40 applications for...and you had ample money, I would see all 40 of them being hooked up to Internet. And you're talking about...you're talking about from 3,000 to 7 or 8 to 10,000, depending on the size of the...on the...that's per district and would be per building, too.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. So if all of your priority one applications are good applications, then you would fund all of those before you go to priority two for anybody, is that...is that correct?

SENATOR ROBINSON: Well, I think it depends what their application would like, whether...

SENATOR BEUTLER: It's for a direct connection.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Well, or maybe they would like some...if you have...you know you really can't...you can't operate the system unless you have some networking. So...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Right. So it's your intention that they would all have the direct connection network first before they...

SENATOR ROBINSON: No, I didn't say that, I didn't say that. I
