

react, you didn't oppose because of some hurt you had had, you tried to do something. Madam President knows what I mean, I can tell. So, thank you very much for listening. I will not subject you for an hour or two hours to listen to all of the amendments that Senator Chambers has drawn and passed out again to you. I respectfully, Madam President, ask to withdraw this resolution. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: It is withdrawn. LR 81. Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Madam Speaker and members of the body, this is an amendment to...I have an amendment to the committee amendments, I believe. And I passed them out...I passed them...is it still my turn?

PRESIDENT ROBAK: If you're starting on the committee amendments, you may go ahead with the committee amendments, yes.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I have an amendment to the committee amendments. So...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Mr. Clerk, why don't we start here.

CLERK: Madam President, LR 81, offered by Senator Wehrbein, was referred to the Government, Military and Veterans Affairs Committee for hearing. Senator Robinson's committee reported the resolution back to the floor for further discussion. I have Government Committee amendments pending.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The Chair recognizes Senator Robinson to open on the committee amendments.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Madam President and members of the body, LR 81 is a resolution that asks that the Legislature recognize certain aspects of the relationship between the State of Nebraska and the Republic of China on Taiwan. The Government Committee held a hearing on the resolution. It appeared that the main point of controversy was the language in the resolution dealing with Taiwan and the United Nations, therefore, the committee amendment strikes any reference to the United Nations in the resolution. Basically, we strike the fifth "Whereas" as a reference to the United Nations in the third resolve. I would ask that the body adopt the committee amendment. Thank you.
