And Senator Beutler seems to forget, or maybe it hasn't been in the conscious part of his mind, that I was serving with him before he became a chairperson. When a person is not a chairperson, his or her view about things is different. When a different role is assumed, that person's point of view begins to change because some of the autocratic power is placed in his or her hands, then it becomes all right. I'm a member of the Executive Board, I still don't want certain things done because it moves other members of the Legislature into a subservient role, it creates elitists and the rest. So you don't just have elitists and peasants, you have sometimes a gradation in between. You have the proletariat, you have the bourgeoisie. But in this body, they want the elitists up here and the peasants at the bottom, and those who are part of the elite class want to be able to determine what is important for all of the rest of us. This is why I make the kind of comments that I do about how I will obstruct them. I'm not going to let them walk over me. I'm not going to let them act as if they're my father and I'm a little boy in short pants and tennis shoes with holes in them worried about getting a licking because I didn't do something my daddy told me to do. Nobody in here is going to deal with me in that fashion. Whatever you bring to me I'm going to give back to you. So I don't care what you do with the rules, we will have our battles. But getting it to a broader perspective, this concept of order, order, order is not a wholesome thing in and of itself in a legislative setting. I remember when Senator Beutler has thrown up a host of amendments, so his morality as far as how we should legislate did not prevent him from doing it when he thought it was of value. But now all of a sudden, it's a terrible thing because he's a chairperson. He can have some control about the bills that will be introduced, the bills that will be advanced from committee, and the way they'll be dealt with on the floor, and he's in a different category when it comes to making and cutting deals now. So his view changes. I'm not like that. My principles don't change because I'm a member of the Executive Board. I'm the only one on this floor who has and will never
