SENATOR PIRSCH: How would you misuse them?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Pirsch, if you don't want the bill, I'm not going to go through all that. Most people on the floor are aware of how people's social security numbers are obtained and used to identify this person or make use of it in a way that is totally illegal. Some institutions, some individuals accept the social security number as an identifying feature. And if this person is falsifying documents and puts the social security number of somebody else, then whatever happens is traced to the owner of that social security number.

SENATOR CROSBY: Time.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Right.

SENATOR CROSBY: Further discussion on LB 905? Senator Chambers, would you like to close. He waives closing. The question is the advancement to E & R Initial of LB 905. All in favor vote aye, opposed no. Record please.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to advance the bill, Madam President.

SENATOR CROSBY: LB 905 advances. Mr. Clerk, LB 906.

ASSISTANT CLERK: LB 906 was introduced by Senator Chambers. (Read title.) The bill was read for the first time on January 3, referred to the Judiciary Committee. That committee reports the bill to General File with no committee amendments.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Chambers, to open on 906.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President and members of the Legislature, again I'm going to be very brief because Senator Kristensen has an amendment he would like to offer. But this bill is brought because of an oversight. Inmate libraries, the legal libraries already get copies of the statutes. They had been getting copies of the Session Laws and the Journals, but the Secretary of State said that since they are not listed specifically in this section of statute along with that multitude of other agencies and individuals, he was not authorized to provide copies of the Session Laws and the
