So this would, in this case, and I can certainly see Senator Chambers' issues. But in this case a company probably doesn't care...I shouldn't say don't care about him, but the company probably does not care whether this person has a handicapped plate or not, all he wants is that person to make contacts. In order for this person to make contacts he has to park a half a block away, depending upon the time of day he gets there. So, in this case, the company probably does not care whether they have the plate or not. If that's true in all instances, I do not know. There are companies that will take advantage of us, absolutely correct. But all companies aren't this way. So, with that, I will close. If we can make this bill better for all of us, hey, I certainly welcome your input and appreciate it, even Speaker Withem. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. The question before the body is the advancement of LB 72. All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Please record.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 1 nay, Madam President, on the advancement of LB 72.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: LB 72 advances. LB 13.

CLERK: Madam President, if I may, right before that, Reference Committee will meet now, Room 2102. Reference Committee now in Room 2102. Madam President, LB 13, by Senator Warner. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 9, referred to the Education Committee, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill, Madam President.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The Chair recognizes Senator Warner to open on the bill.

SENATOR WARNER: Madam President, members of the Legislature, I move to advance the bill to E & R Initial. What LB 13 does, it makes a slight modification in existing statute. To give you some background, back, I think, in the early sixties the
