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SENATOR MATZKE: I don't believe so, Senator Chambers, because under Section 4 of the bill, Senator Jones has provided five separate instances where liability is still maintained. And one of those instances in which liability would be maintained would...would...I think relates to failure to reasonably inspect...failure to make a reasonable and prudent effort, dangerous latent conditions, or any other act or omission that a reasonable and prudent person would not have done. So I think, under the exceptions, that type of conduct would still main...would be exempted and liability would still be maintained.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Matzke, then what you stated...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...could be interpreted as a standard of negligence, which is not unknown to the law. So if we could more artfully draw that language, and I would want you to look at it. In Section 4, that you mentioned, can we kind of try to massage that language, and then it would cover everything else that's under the bill. And somebody may be working the language and I'm not sure, but that's all I would have to say on Senator Matzke's amendment. I just can't vote for it because of the things that I've said, but I'm not going to oppose it any further.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Matzke announces that the following guests are visiting the Legislature today, Ellen and Skip Hove are here today. Ellen is Senator Matzke's sister. They are both under the south balcony. Will you stand and be recognized, please. Senator Dierks to speak to the Matzke amendment.

SENATOR DIERKS: I want to speak to the bill.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Landis, to speak to the Matzke amendment. Seeing no further discussion on the Matzke amendment, the Chair recognizes Senator Matzke to close.

SENATOR MATZKE: Madam President, the amendment is a very small amendment. And if there is any problem with the language, I'll
