CLERK: I do, Madam President, thank you. Reference Report referring...Reference Report referring gubernatorial appointment to Standing Committee for confirmation hearing. New resolution, LR 83, by Senator Stuhr. (Read brief summary.) Senator Jim Jensen has selected LB 280 as his priority bill. I have a hearing notice from the Education Committee, that's signed by Senator Bohlke. I have a second hearing notice from Health Committee, that's signed by Senator Wesely. In addition, Madam President, the following reports--your Committee on Health and Human Services reports LB 424 to General File; LB...that's signed by Senator Wesely. General Affairs Committee reports LB 45 to General File with amendments attached; LB 148 to General File with committee amendments attached; LB 248 to General File with committee amendments attached; LB 249 to General File with committee amendments attached; LB 848 to General File with amendments attached; and LB 482, indefinitely postponed. Those reports signed by Senator Schelleper. That's all that I have, Madam President. (See pages 799-804 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. LB 502.

CLERK: Madam President, 502, a bill by Senator Preister. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 17 of this year, at that time referred to the Urban Affairs Committee. The bill was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending, Madam President. (See AM0359 on page 639 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Preister, to open on your bill.

SENATOR PREISTER: Thank you, Honorable President, friends all. Hopefully the slaughter is over and now on the slaughterhouse bill we won't have any real contentiousness. This bill really is one that I think is something that is an issue of just creating a buffer zone, simply that, no more, no less, between where a future slaughterhouse would set up its operation in a residential area. The current statute requires that a paunch manure rendering or sewage treatment plant be located at least 3,300 feet from a residential area. My legislation would simply
