actually decide the issue. Three could decide the issue if all the rest of them were not voting. So all the amendment does is specify that you're going to have at least ten people there to do business. And then if you do those specific kinds of businesses...business, which are most critical to the commission, that you're going to require at least eight members to vote for any one of those decisions, and that is very nearly half of the commission, if you don't count the chair. So it is, I think, a fair proposal and one that gives the commission perhaps some specific direction about its quorum and the votes that are required for those very significant decisions that they can make and then follow that up with recommendations to us. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Wickersham. Is there any discussion of the Wickersham amendment? Seeing none, Senator Wickersham, do you wish to close? Senator Wickersham, do you wish to close? Closing is waived. The question before you is the adoption of the Wickersham amendment to LB 229. All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Please record.
