PRESIDENT ROBAK: Final Reading is dispensed with. LB 453

CLERK: (Read title of LB 453.)

PRESIDENT ROBAK: All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 453 pass? All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Please record.

CLERK: (Read record vote found on pages 970-71 of the Legislative Journal.) 42 ayes, 0 nays, 2 present and not voting, 5 excused and not voting.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: LB 453 passes. LB 107.

CLERK: Madam President, Senator Matzke would move to return the bill. Senator, I understand you would like to withdraw AM684.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Matzke.

SENATOR MATZKE: Yes, Madam President.

CLERK: And Senator Matzke would move to return for AM869 is what I have in front of me, Senator. (See page 971 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR MATZKE: Yes, I'd like to withdraw AM684 and substitute AM869.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The first amendment is withdrawn. Senator Matzke, to open on the amendment...on the motion, excuse me.

SENATOR MATZKE: Thank you, Madam President. This bill deals with mountain sheep. It was amended a couple of times by Senator Wickersham and Senator Beutler. After it was amended, it became evident that there was a conflict because the bill still contained a provision that it shall be unlawful to possess mountain sheep. There's also another concern, and that is that I have constituents who have mounts of mountain sheep that were
