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PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...safer and we're going to give them more protection. Then, if we get the chance, we're going to pass a bill that makes each and every traffic stop a crisis of conscience for the cop, who has to be on guard for a gun, who then has to be on guard for the person who has that gun, to think whether or not they have a right to carry it, or they don't have the right to carry it, and to put in a moment of indecision in how they respond. And, by the way, law-abiding citizens that have guns drawn on them by cops aren't going to be very happy either, and they're going to have a downside there. It is a hypocrisy to think that on the one hand we're going to make it safer for the cops by increasing the death penalty's use for them, and on the same breath, in the same session, pass a law that will make every taillight that is out, every overdue license plate that produces those whirring lights and the pull-over and puts the cop in the situation of having to second-guess the citizen as to why they have that gun strapped on their hip.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Time. Thank you, Senator Landis. Senator Kiel.

SENATOR KIEL: Yes, thank you, Madam President. I want to reiterate, I think it's been brought up a couple of times already, and I'm going to bring it up again because I think it's important to remember, that the Police Chiefs Association of Nebraska, the Nebraska Sheriffs Association, Police Officer Association of Nebraska said, we don't like this legislation. And with all due respect, I don't care what the police officers in Orange County Florida said, I don't care about whether the public safety officers of our state are happy with this or feel good about this, it's obvious that they don't. Something that is sort of corollary to this is to talk about what kind of training that people would have to have in order to receive a license to carry a firearm. Law enforcement officers know the dangers that are associated with the use of firearms. They are extensively trained on the use and security, and I repeat, security of their service weapons, yet many are still killed every year by guns. A recent FBI study showed that police officers who are killed in the line of duty rarely even fire a
