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English and understand how we draft laws, since what he tells you is what you're going to do. You pointed out that you were trying to follow the discussion, but obviously you didn't. You said that people from other parts of the country like Nebraska's law the way it is. Well, I'm not willing to accept what these lunatic fringe people from other parts of the country, who cannot even read our laws, tell you they ought to have you agree to. But I admire your spunk, because after having not read the law correctly, admitting that your LA, who can't read the law either, told you what to say and misled you, you're now advising everybody else in the Legislature, because you can't follow the discussion, to accept the conclusion that you reached because you have an LA who can't read, who doesn't understand the law. So when you inject that kind of thing into the discussion, I'm going to deal with it. And sometimes the bigger the crowd the more foolish the remarks that some people make on the floor, because they're playing to the balcony. Now, Senator Brashear, if you would yield, I would like to continue our discussion.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Mr. Speaker, yes, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Brashear, at the time that the court is going to finally make its decision in the case before it, namely that the marriage which has been challenged that was entered into in another jurisdiction, we both know that the law of that jurisdiction will have been in existence prior to the court making this decision. In other words, the law under which this marriage was entered into predated the court's decision. So, we're looking now at a fact which has been accomplished, purportedly under the existing law of that jurisdiction. Either that marriage is or is not valid. What I want the law of Nebraska to say, at the time that that decision is being made by the court, either this marriage is or is not, not that it would be if some other circumstances came into play. The Supreme Court, or whichever court of record is handling this challenge, is going to look at a specific point in time, and that point in time is when these people entered into this marriage, then determine what was the law at that particular time. And based on those considerations either this marriage is or is not valid in that jurisdiction. If it's found that it was valid in that jurisdiction at the time it was entered into, it will be recognized in Nebraska.
