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happen to agree. I don't want to take anything away from her efforts because she put a lot of effort in this too, but I don't think that it is worth the trouble for the courts to test this, and then find it to fail. I just don't think it's worth the trouble. The trouble we're talking about is the trouble of doing one of these petition drives. Unless someone has been involved with it, you have no idea the work involved, the foot work, the phone work, the money that it takes to do this. It's an expensive, expensive process. Stan Dobrovolny has done this twice. He's been through this twice, and both times he was not able to get his on the ballot because of one time signature requirement changes, and another time because he lacked the signatures, but they've spent a tremendous amount of money to get this on the ballot, and there's a lot of foot work and a lot of people driving lots of miles. I think it is not...I think it is, the courts, she says it would not be worth the trouble...it would be worth the trouble, I think it is not worth the trouble. I...I'm concerned, too, about...I guess more than anything about how our citizens are looked on in the issue. I think that sometimes our citizens are more or less looked on as second-class citizens and that they shouldn't have the right to petition. All states don't do that. But then there are no other states that have the Unicameral, and this Unicameral system was established with that in mind that these people would have another way to petition government. And I would hate to see us destroy that process. Senator Withem mentioned something about...I think it was Senator Crosby that mentioned something about she wished we could go back to the way that it was, but that's not possible. I suppose that it isn't possible, the bill that I have, the LA...the resolution I had two years ago would have made it possible but this body didn't let that happen, and so it didn't...it wasn't possible, I guess, although if this body has a mind to do it, it could be possible. And Senator Withem mentioned the fact that the citizens have voted that they want the higher numbers. He is referring to the...to the constitutional amendment that was on the ballot last fall in November. Well, I maintain that the citizens didn't know what they were voting about. I had a number of people come to me after the election, during election day, and tell me...well, I remember one expression I heard three times at the auction market in Atkinson; hey, Doc, I went to the polls and I voted down all the constitutional amendments, is that right? You
