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juvenile crime lately, I guess the reason I made the move to bracket is because I think that the focus has changed. It came up very quickly. I think I'd like time to go back and visit with my constituents because this is certainly an area of concern that we have in central Nebraska. Again, as I said, it's a very costly project and Senator Wehrbein just provided kind of a voice of wisdom about the cost of crime. We are going to have a new facility for violent juvenile offenders in Omaha, possibly a new adult prison, and now this, and I am wondering, if this does not address the juvenile issue, if there will be any money in the future where we would be able to do that. And so, I guess what I am asking for is time to go and explore this, and I would hope that the Legislature will grant the time so that we can go back and visit with our constituents about this project.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Thank you. You've heard the opening. The Chair would recognize Senator Engel to discuss the motion to bracket.

SENATOR ENGEL: Mr. Chairman and members of the body, again, I oppose the bracket motion. I think we've spent several hours discussing this on General File. We passed it to Select File, and we have, I am sure, several more hours of discussion. We do have some more amendments to the bill, and I would certainly like to have everybody hear exactly what the bill is going to be as amended. I still believe it's a good program. It was highly recommended by the Department of Corrections, and I had a conversation with them yesterday, Harold Clarke. There is an article in the World-Herald today by Harold Clarke. If you...maybe we can get a copy of that and pass it out. He had...gave a speech yesterday and he highly recommends this work camp concept because we do have...we all know we have a huge crime problem in the state of Nebraska, in fact, in the whole country, and the thing is not going to get any better. This is a step...this isn't the cure-all, this is a step, and this is for a particular group of people, so your youthful offenders, I am sure, as Senator Chambers has said, we need...we need more programs at the...down in the tender ages, and then the problem with some of those programs, they start at the tender age, and then they go...then they lapse, and then there is that gap in between. So we need all those programs, but the problem is not
