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SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Coordsen, members of the Legislature. This is a smaller matter that kind of snuck up on my today, and I say that because I didn't have a chance to talk to Senator Brashear about it and I don't know how he feels about it. So let me tell you what the amendment is and he can indicate how he feels about it. LB 558 deals with allowing certain people to call themselves "certified industrial hygienist", and they are the ones that can be these people that can do this work. And you're able to do that if you receive that designation from the American Board of Industrial Hygiene. Now, I don't know who the American Board of Industrial Hygiene is. It sounds very good, but my problem with the bill is that there's no relationship between the publicly authorized regulatory authorities and this entity out there, whatever it is. So...so, for example, that particular institute could say you had to be a member of some occult religious sect in order to be certified. We don't have any control over their certification process. And although that example was ridiculous, I think you can understand what I mean. And so what the amendment does, it says "the Department of Health and Human Services may...", may...not required to, may, "...adopt and promulgate rules and regulations to implement the Certified Industrial Hygienist Title Protection Act and to further regulate the use of the term 'certified industrial hygienist'". So that if a problem even comes up it affords the Department of Health an opportunity to make a rule and regulation and to get involved and to straighten out the situation. Otherwise, we're just letting something float out there which we have no control over. Senator, I would give the rest of my time to you and afford you the opportunity to respond.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Mr. Chairman, members of the body.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Yeah.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: My position would be that Senator Beutler is only making a good bill better and I intend to support his amendment. Thank you. I yield your time back, Senator Beutler.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Senator Brashear, your light is next. Senator Brashear waives off. Did you wish to say anything in closing? Closing is waived. The issue before the body, then,
