SENATOR CUDABACK: So under your bill she won't necessarily be guaranteed a position, but she will go along with, you might say, with the students to this other district, along and be...

SENATOR HILGERT: Yeah, that's correct. This doesn't...this does not guarantee employment, this amendment, it doesn't go that far.

SENATOR CUDABACK: But the school board of that district would then make a decision on whether she should...

SENATOR WESELY: One minute.

SENATOR CUDABACK: ...go...

SENATOR HILGERT: Yeah, I believe the school board has the reduction in force policies, and they've decided on what that policy is. And I don't...I'm not familiar with every school district, I'm certainly not familiar with yours.

SENATOR CUDABACK: This is...I guess this is one part of the big picture. (LB) 806 is a major step. It may be just...it may be one of my toughest, you might say, situations since I've been here. I have to go speak to a number of students now from a district that, potentially, they could lose 53 percent of their current funding. I will be speaking with them at three o'clock. And so if I'm not back afterwards, you know where I'm at. So....

SENATOR WESELY: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Before the Chair recognizes the next speaker, we'd like to introduce a special guest. Under the south balcony Mr. Byong Kon Yoo of Korea. If you would please stand, he's a visitor with the Mayor's Committee for International Friendship. He will be studying the Legislature for two weeks. We welcome you to the Nebraska Legislature. Chair recognizes Senator Jones.

SENATOR JONES: Mr. Chairman and members of the body, I just kind of want to lead off just a little bit on 806. I've really got a lot of problems with it the way it's wrote up right now. It addresses three main things, it's school reorganization, school finance, and educational unit services that we're going
