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capital construction bill. It starts, if you are interested, on page 64 of your manual that was handed out that gives a summary in total dollars. On page 65, 66, 67 and 68 is a brief summary of what the capital construction projects are and you will notice in there it has to do with the new dietary facility in Grand Island Veterans Home, the 800-bed and the 128-bed segregation space diagnostic and evaluation center and the 800-bed general custody prison facility. It renovates Wayne State College building called, Connell Hall. Has a Miller Hall renovation at Chadron State College. It does the information, science, technology and engineering initiative which is in Omaha, so called FDRUNO project, and that is on the top of page 67 for those that are interested. It amounts to 23 million even dollars of general funds and is otherwise financed by \$13 million in private funds. It funds a livestock teaching center at Curtis. It does masonry and structure repair to the State Capitol. For those of you who are interested that is going to be a continuing project. It will start slowly this year and continue over the next nine or ten years. The total cost of that will be approximately \$20.6 million. This summer there will be contractors and workmen in here demonstrating their technique and their ability so that we might do a good job on this famous structure, actually, and we will start out with \$522,000 this next year, two million in 1998-99 and then three million per year from 1999 through the year 2004 and 2005. In this also is a recommendation by the Appropriations Committee to do quite a bit of renovation using cigarette tax, I should say repair and maintenance for buildings, not renovation at this point and then to also add an additional \$10 million per year for that purpose for repair and maintenance of buildings, the so called 309 funding. There is an explanation of that on page 68. And with that, there is also, if you will notice in here, three is reaffirmation of previous commitments, that is on page 69 and 70. Those are reaffirmations which we do in our budget each year for those that are ongoing, not yet completed, or in this case, proposed, one that is being proposed that we are still waiting for federal funds is replace the Norfolk Federal Veterans' Home facilities. We, if you recall, two years ago put that money in cash, I think it was about \$5.6 million. We are still presently waiting for \$10 million of federal funds. When that becomes available that can continue. It goes on down the line to some of the things that, once again, we made previous
