and put the word out. And again, I intervened. I had to go through that, but if you reject this amendment, I will have the opportunity to lay that on the record in great detail. I will name the white female officer who was involved, I believe that was one of them, the police chief over at the university, the university officials that I talked to, the one that I said they should have gotten rid of and they didn't. I will lay it all out and it will be crystal clear in everybody's mind why I am so upset about the way the university has comported itself. What I am speaking to right now though...

SENATOR WILL: Time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...is the first division of the amendment.

SENATOR WILL: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Before we proceed to further debate, there are several groups of guests that the Chair would like to recognize. Senator Witek has some guests, 35 fourth graders from Oak Valley Elementary School in Omaha. (Introduced teachers.) They are seated in the north balcony and some under the north balcony. Please rise and be recognized by the Legislature. Also, Senator Coordsen has some guests that are in the north balcony, from the Thayer County Leadership Group, 17 adults. I guess they're in the south balcony. Please rise and be recognized. And finally, Senator Don Pederson has some guests that are under the north balcony, all from North Platte, Mark Blackledge, Linda Rousey and Paul Brochtrup, and I apologize if I mispronounced any names. Please rise. Thank you. Senator Kristensen, you are next.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Legislature. All I can say is, welcome to university politics. You have now learned what it's like, and you know what will happen, is that central administration will crack the whip, got to keep in line, got to keep those campuses together, and what will occur is they'll get...they'll pick each one of you off, one by one, and you'll wind up and you'll see what...what happens here. There's \$750,000 setting out in central administration that they've basically been told that they've got to do something with, and here's an opportunity to do something with that, and tomorrow will never come. One of the most bitter pills that's out here is the Information and Technology Center.
