Spencer School of Business, I'm trying to think who else had talked to me, Senator Tyson, Senator Schellpeper, Senator Dierks. There were a few of those...there's not...I mean, I suppose there's a handful around the state, the trouble is it wasn't their making. And if we take the e-clause off at this point, and that's done simply by voting "no" the first time and the second time voting "yes", that you can solve that and hold those people harmless. So that's what I would urge you to do. It's one of those deals where you have unintended circumstances. I want to try to fix it, and this is the easiest and best way to do that. Sorry for the inconvenience, but I think it...I think it would be in the best interest of the Legislature before that goes into play to do that. So I'd ask you to vote "no" the first time. Please vote "yes" the second. But I understand if you feel the urge not to do that, and thank you for your time. And if there are any questions, Madam President, I'm going to leave the motion there for just a little bit because I know there are people who want to get to other bills. I'll be happy to answer any questions and would leave my light on.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Kristensen. Senator Maurstad.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: Senator Kristensen, do you know, approximately, how many individuals would be involved in...are we talking about the loss of a partial...part of a scholarship or what's...what's the actual impact, do you know?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Well, I think if you'd have it for the entire year, and some of these, I think the most is \$9100 that goes to any one institution of this, so it...we're not talking about a lot of money, but what's happened for most of these people is the allocations for this year have been made so you're not talking about current ones. You're talking about ones that will be made in the future. Those are, I think, made in July, if I remember right. The allocations are made in July. So if the bill doesn't become effective until September, you've gained another year and that's what holds them harmless.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: Are these need-based scholarships?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Yes.
