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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Bohlke, do you know what that breakdown is?

SENATOR BOHLKE: I was trying to remember what the exact breakdown, but I know that there is an...I know that there are political parties and an independent.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now, is the party in power given more representation on the commission? Do you know, or is there a stated number from each party which would be on the commission regardless of which party happens to be in office?

SENATOR BOHLKE: I believe it's a stated number from each party regardless of whomever may be Governor and the party that person represents.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Members of the Legislature, I have not paid a lot of attention to the political account...to this Accountability and Disclosure Commission, but if I remember correctly, the Secretary of State is allowed to make some appointments, so I'm going to ask Senator Bohlke to help me in that area again, if she will. Senator Bohlke, would you yield to a couple more questions?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you know how many appointments the Secretary of State is allowed to make to the commission? Is it...

SENATOR BOHLKE: I do not know the total number, but I do know he has that authority.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Somebody just signaled to me four, and the total number...I accept what you say. You've never misled me, Senator Chris Peterson. I accept it. If there are no...are there any other lights on? Then I'm going to leave mine on while I read this so that there won't be a closing before I get a chance to finish this. And my time can be running. All right. The commission consists of eight appointed members and the Secretary of State for a total of nine members. This brings
