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SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Master...Master Speaker and members, one question or at least a clarification. Senator Chambers, on this reimbursement I am assuming that you could also call this a credit back against a county. Maybe I'm just being very technical, but I support your amendment. But if there was a \$1,000 bill and they could put a \$500 credit against that, rather than reimburse the \$1,000, and, like I say, I may be technical. It just struck me that way that it wouldn't have to be a written check, it could be a credit against the account that the state may owe the county or whatever.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's...that's correct, Senator Wehrbein. And when I was discussing it, before we had this amendment drafted, at an earlier stage, I was saying that it wouldn't necessarily have to take the form of cash; it could even be a part of this very program where maybe they would have something coming for other prisoners, and it would just be a set-off against what they were going to recoup...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Right, I just wanted to make...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...on those prisoners.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...that clear. Maybe it wasn't.... I didn't hear that on the first part. But I do support the amendment. I think it's a fair...a fair issue to do, and I support it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. A question of Senator Cudaback, if he would respond. Senator Cudaback, I need...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Cudaback, would you respond, please?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Yes, sir.
