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to bring to your attention which was not...did not have to do with making things consistent was the fact that we incorporated into this bill, because there seemed to be demand across the state for it, the provisions of LB 830, which was Senator Hillman's bill, which allows for the taking away of licenses in situations primarily where poaching is involved, increases poaching penalties, and increases the damages for poaching penalties. All of those changes that are intended and are a consequence and related to 830 are found, beginning on page...beginning at page 181 of the bill and continuing on through page 185-6 of the bill. So, if you're interested in the poaching changes, and if you're interested in the real substantive changes that are made in the bill, you might want to look at those sections. But with that, I think, I will stop and invite your questions, and certainly most interested in anybody who's willing to take a look at some of these provisions and double-checking us on what we've done. But, I think that gives you the picture of what's happening, and again, I'm going to stop with that and invite your questions. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Hillman.

SENATOR HILLMAN: Madam Speaker, members, I rise in support of 922. Senator Beutler has referred to a bill that I introduced last year that the Natural Resources Committee, at the time, recognized, I think, the need for some changes, did not advance the bill, but with the understanding that they would look at including those changes in a bill this session, along with the assistance and the guidance of the Game and Parks Commission, which has been done. The parts that look at some of the penalties, when it comes to poaching, and there were several people that testified last year on this bill, is that Nebraska, I think, is way out of line in looking at some of their enforcement policies. And if you look at the monetary punishments and so forth that go on in other states, Nebraska still isn't anywhere near to their surrounding states. But at least this would get the attention, I think, of some poachers, those that, in state and out of state, that don't feel compelled to follow what was currently in statute, that fishing and hunting and so forth in the state of Nebraska is a privilege, not a right, and that they need to be able to comply with the law or not have the privilege to continue, and that's basically
