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determine capacity to pay for road miles, and then distribute dollars based on the difference between those two amounts. We have a handout that we've distributed to you, and the last page of the handout shows an example of how the formula would work, for example, for Cedar County. So if you want to follow through how the formula works, you can do that with...with that last page. The more important aspects of this proposal is, as you can see by the analysis that we've attached in front of the example of the formula, that this is an attempt to deliver state aid to those counties who would be experiencing difficulties meeting the objectives of the 1114 levy limitations. As you recall, last year we made significant gains towards assisting schools to meet the 1114 limitations with the combination of additional state aid, and the provisions of 806. We also last year made, or two years ago made provisions for municipalities in the form of a municipal equalization pool where we added in \$11 million and distributed that basically on a capacity and need formulation. This is the same kind of concept, although formulated in a different way, for counties, and 1136 does a very effective job of driving state aid to counties that need aid as a result of the 1114 cuts. You'll see in the analysis that is the fifth page down in the packet that you have where counties would receive money solely by reason of this amendment. That's the one that's captioned, Impact of Amendment 3747 to LB 695. You can see where the \$5.5 million is distributed. You can see, if you look at the bottom, that it is 76 percent effective in reaching our goal of providing aid to counties that have 1114 impacts. With that 5.5 million, we offset 24 percent of the cuts. You see a similar analysis for 695 as it stands now before you with a rate of \$35 per prisoner. It is not quite as effective by itself as it would be with this amendment. It is only 35 percent effective in reaching our objective if you pass 695 in the form that it is now. The combination of the two is still 48 percent effective, which is an improvement and I think a desirable one in the effectiveness of 695 to meet an objective of providing aid to counties that would experience cuts, some of them very, very substantial cuts, as a result of LB 1114. The combination of the two bills, 1136 and 695, means that we will be delivering state aid to every county in the state on one basis or another with very, very few exceptions. Now I understand that some people are concerned because their county doesn't receive dollars under this proposal. Well, I
