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ask for here, no additional money. First of all, I agree with the Health and Human Service policy of appropriate level of services for patients, no more than they need, no less than they need. We agree with HHS that there is a serious lack of community service to serve patients. The \$10 million appropriated for community service in this budget is something that we should applaud. I agree that no services should be cut until appropriate community service bases, community-based services are up and running which is not the case now. Fourth, I agree that using the trained employees of the regional center in this process in training and in development of community rehabilitative service is a good thing. Then why is this necessary? Individuals with mental health problems and their families are some of the most vulnerable citizens that we have in this state. And of all the responsibilities that the state has, the responsibility to be the safety net for these individuals is paramount. It's the responsibility of the Legislature to ensure that that policy of the state is carried out. The reality is that in November there's going to be a new administration. Potentially there are going to be new personnel at Health and Human Services. Additionally, with Senator Wesely leaving the Legislature, there is going to be a change in the Legislature's Health and Human Services Committee and Senator Wesely will take with him probably the most extensive tribal memory, if I could term it that, of what has gone before. These changes make it almost impossible for immediate effective oversight of the redesign. I say what I have said before. There is no specific plan. There are policies but no plan. My bill protects the or my amendment rather protects the regional centers during the transition. This just takes HHS at their words and lets them act accordingly. Additionally, this also takes HHS at their word to utilize regional center employees. Continuing to fund the regional centers does not mean the design is frozen. The utilization of regional centers' employees in the process and the programs can continue, and I think that this is a fiscally sound, fair and responsible way to proceed. Finally, let me bring some reality to this body. I recently received a phone call from a lady here in Lincoln, Margaret Medel, who is the president of the Nebraska Family Support Network. I was not there to take her phone call, but my administrative assistant took it down and I want to read you what she took down. And I think this sums up the situation in
