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SENATOR HILLMAN: Yes.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay. All right. I'm going to emphasize again that I think it's helpful, anywhere we can, to identify when you have to go through the process and when you don't. And I certainly don't have any problem with an entity that gets a lottery grant, going through the technical review panel for recommendations or advice. Senator Hillman, if I could follow up with one more question on that, if you would yield.

SENATOR HILLMAN: Yes.

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Hillman, if they went to the technical review panel, and that technical review panel said, that looks like a good proposal, then does that recommendation go to the commission, and the commission approves or considers that recommendation...

SENATOR HILLMAN: From what I understand, no, because the project has been approved by the lottery grant.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay, so it's just...

SENATOR HILLMAN: And it's just that they would use the type of technical equipment would be looked at.

SENATOR BROMM: So if the technical...I'm sorry. If the technical review panel said, we don't think that this is set up the way it should be, and they say, no, then are those ESUs precluded from continuing on the course of action and they have to resubmit a different proposal, or what's the result then?

SENATOR HILLMAN: As I would see it, the project has been approved. What the technical review panel would say, this technology is not compatible with the minimum standards that will be developed by the NITC. Okay? And it will not interconnect, it will not do what you would like to see it do. So you can either go back to the drawing board as far as the equipment only goes, not what you want to accomplish.

SENATOR BROMM: Um-hum.
