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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Legislature. I'd like to ask Senator Bruning a couple of questions. Senator Bruning, when you came to my seat, I told you that I was trying to read through your amendments, so I have a couple of things I need to get your help on. On page 2 of your amendment, it says in the statement of intent or purpose, "The Coordinating commission for Postsecondary Education shall establish and maintain an information data base which details (a) current efforts by the Nebraska public, nonprofit, or private postsecondary educational institutions to recruit students from Nebraska and other states..." Now when we get to page 4, line 9, "Loans pursuant to the program shall be limited to part-time and full-time Nebraska resident students who are enrolled..." does that mean that you have to be a citizen of Nebraska to get this loan? What does that mean? If you're going to recruit students from out of state, why do you say they have to be Nebraska resident students in order to get the loan?

SENATOR BRUNING: Well the intention, Senator, is to comply with the constitution and have these people be Nebraska residents. Now they certainly can become Nebraska residents. If you are a nonresident student, you stay in the state for a certain amount of time, six months I think it is at the University of Nebraska, you can become a resident.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Can you be a full-time student at Nebraska without being a resident?

SENATOR BRUNING: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Now when you get to page 5, in line 12, it talks about for full-time students enrolled in this program that they're talking about, where is... is there language in here that deals with the part-time student, in terms of getting a loan and how that is handled?

SENATOR BRUNING: Well, this particular language that you're talking about, Senator, deals with full-time students.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But there's language that talks of full-time... about full-time and part time students.
