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it has been in the past. And Senator Robak's amendment is not the way to go about it because it takes one more bite, one more nibble by a goldfish, instead of the tearing action of a school of piranha. We've got to attack the entire problem--private providers, public providers, the entire spectrum across the state. That's the way to do it, it can be done. Legislation will be offered to attempt that, and we can work it out here on the floor in the next session. In the interim I would ask that you vote against the Robak amendment. I will surrender the balance of my time to the Chair, ma'am. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Tyson. Senator Robak.

SENATOR ROBAK: Thank you, Madam President, members of the body. Senator Tyson, I just want to ask you a question, please. And I don't feel bad following Senator Landis or following you at all, in this, 'cause I got my heart in this 100 percent, I'm sorry.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator. Senator Tyson.

SENATOR TYSON: Yes.

SENATOR ROBAK: Senator Tyson, you said that next year there's an attempt to come up with a comprehensive plan. State some of those attempts, next year, that we're going to come up to solve this, what you call a problem in mental health.

SENATOR TYSON: I'm sorry, I'm not trying to be obtuse, but would you give me that again please.

SENATOR ROBAK: Yeah. You said that next year there's going to be an attempt to...you hope that I will support your efforts next year, because there is an attempt to come up with a comprehensive plan that we can all vote for in the state mental health, whatever you called it, in Nebraska. What is it?

SENATOR TYSON: Comprehensive mental health plan for Nebraska...

SENATOR ROBAK: Yeah, yeah, sure.

SENATOR TYSON: ...yes. You want me to do what?
