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amendments I don't think are even objected to by the industry themselves. There are some sticking points in the committee amendments and those are addressed in one or two of the amendments that are on the board to come up before this body and I know that hopefully the committee chair and Senator Schellpeper and others are trying to make a comprehensive amendment that will take care of most of the problems of both sides. Having said that, I think sometimes you reach a point with particularly a bill like this that you can't really go any further in committee and it needs to get to the floor and be exposed to the light of the entire body and the judgment of the entire body, and this is one of those times. I wouldn't feel good going home and doing nothing on this entire issue, and it would appear at this point that the likelihood of Senator Schmitt's bill going forward for passage is pretty slim. And if this bill didn't come to the floor and...and be worked with, we would do nothing. I don't think...I don't think that's acceptable to the majority of my constituents nor to yours. I think also that most...many people in the livestock industry, whether it be cattle, hogs or chickens or whatever, recognize that when you have the change in numbers of applications for large livestock units like we've had show up in the state in the last year, 18 months, that you better stop and check and make sure that you're prepared to deal with that, and so I think the attention is entirely appropriate. I would like to advise the entire body that wasn't able to be at our committee hearing on 1209, 1196 and 1355 of some testimony from Director Wood from DEQ. In response to a question, how disastrous would it be if we simply would provide you with more resources to do your job and do nothing else, Director Wood responds: Senator, we have been faulted over the past six to eight months for changing rules in the middle of the ball game. In fact, we haven't changed any regulations. What we have done is I've looked at the regulations that we have on the books and it's patently clear to me that we haven't been doing what we should be doing under those regulations.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: But I am convinced as we're going forward that we can do, using the current regulations, we can do, I think, a pretty good job. Then later in his testimony once more he was
